RICHMOND'S HIDDEN CHURCH

Holy Trinity Church is tucked away in Sheen Park. From Richmond Circus, go up Church Road and turn left at the traffic lights into Sheen Road. You need the fourth turning on your left (there are two Sheen Park roads) to get to our Church.

The Laying of the Foundation Stone was performed by HRH The Princess Mary Adelaide of Teck, mother of Queen Mary, on 26 August 1869. 2,000 people turned up and the Princess, who shortly after came to live at White Lodge, Richmond Park, attended services at HTR on one or two further occasions.

VERSES TO LIVE BY



THE CHRISTMAS TRUCE



The Christmas Truce was a series of widespread, unofficial ceasefires that took place along the Western Front during the Great War in 1914. During the week before Christmas Day, parties of German and British soldiers exchanged seasonal greetings and songs between their trenches.

On occasions, the tension was reduced to the point that individuals, bearing gifts, would walk across to talk to their opposite numbers and many soldiers from both sides, including some from French units, independently ventured into No Man's Land where they mingled, exchanging food and souvenirs.

As well as joint burial ceremonies, several meetings ended in carol singing (Silent Night was the favoured choice) and some even joined together to play football.



STREET PASTORS



Richmond Street Pastors were recently joined by Police, local Councillors and the general public to launch their all new wagon! This wagon will most certainly become a local haven for those suffering the effects of alcohol or feeling vulnerable on a night out in Richmond.

You will probably have seen the Street Pastors in their royal blue fleeces patrolling the streets of Richmond on Friday evenings. A typical evening involves being on duty from 20.30-04.00 - out on the streets for two hours, having a break and debriefing session, and then spending a further two hours on the streets. Street Pastors work in teams of three or four, a mix of men and women. They carry out their role every week although it is hoped more people will train so the team can expand. Five Street Pastors come from our Church and have wonderful stories to tell.

AUTUMN ALPHA



Over 20 people began our latest Alpha course, a series of informal sessions to discuss the Christian faith.

We've followed our usual format of supper together, followed by a talk and then small groups to chat. We've been blessed by the wonderful food served on these evenings - a big thank you from us all to the various groups and individuals who've provided these meals!

WE CAN AND MUST DO BETTER*



It may surprise you to know that levels of child poverty in our Borough have doubled in less than two years, with 15% (October 2014) of our children living below the poverty line, up from 7% (February 2013).

Today, people across the UK will struggle to feed themselves and their families. Redundancy, illness, benefit delay, domestic violence, debt, family breakdown and the additional costs of heating during winter are just some of the reasons why people go hungry - hence the need for Foodbanks. A simple box of food makes a big difference in helping prevent unnecessary crime, family breakdown and mental health problems.

Food is donated by the public and sorted by volunteers. Frontline care professionals such as doctors and social workers identify people in crisis and issue a food voucher which entitles that person to receive three days of nutritionally balanced, non-perishable foods. It also allows time to chat, provide support and signpost people to other helpful services.

The Trussell Trust partners with churches and communities to open Foodbanks nationwide. To date there are 420. Recently, the Trust has piloted 'Eat Well, Spend Less' courses that teach people how to cook on a low budget. They are now looking for funding to roll out this scheme and, if you or your company could help fund this necessary project, please go to www.trusselltrust.org

Our nearest foodbanks are in Richmond (The Vineyard Community Centre, The Vineyard, Richmond, TW10 6AQ - 020 8940 0274), Isleworth and Barnes, and collections are organised at supermarkets on dedicated days. BOOK REVIEW - GOD ON MUTE - PETE GREIG

Whilst many books on prayer tell a reader how to gain more from their devotional times, or give practical instructions on how to spend time with God, God on Mute is different. It faces up to one of the most difficult challenges a Christian must face - what to do when God is silent?

The way Pete structured the book was particularly helpful. We follow Jesus' journey from Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and eventually Easter Sunday to contrast our own suffering and the loneliness that can accompany unanswered prayer. The part of the book that really spoke to me was Holy Saturday. Pete makes an excellent point - "Holy Saturday seems to me to describe the place in which many of us live our lives: waiting for God to speak. We know that Jesus died for us yesterday. We trust that there may be miracles tomorrow. But what of today - this eternal Sabbath where heaven is silent? Where, we wonder, is God now?"

Pete shows his vulnerability and candour in describing just how hard unanswered prayer can be. In my own life I have been dealing with this. You do wonder where is God and how can He leave me this way for so long.

God on Mute doesn't claim to offer foolproof answers or solutions to unanswered prayers and the silence of God, but it does provide encouragement, insight and some practical advice, along with a 'big picture' interpretation of the reasons why this may be happening to us at any given time. It is also written humbly and with great grace, not demanding any more of the reader than the author would expect of himself.

This book above all is rooted in hope - hope for unanswered prayers and difficult questions, hope for individuals and for our world, hope that can only come through the suffering of Good Friday, the silence of Easter Saturday and then finally the glory of Easter Sunday. If you are struggling with unanswered prayer, with silence, with hopelessness, then I encourage you to get your hands on a copy of this book, but perhaps more importantly begin to engage with the silence. Don't draw away but begin to seek God even in the silence, with all your heart.
