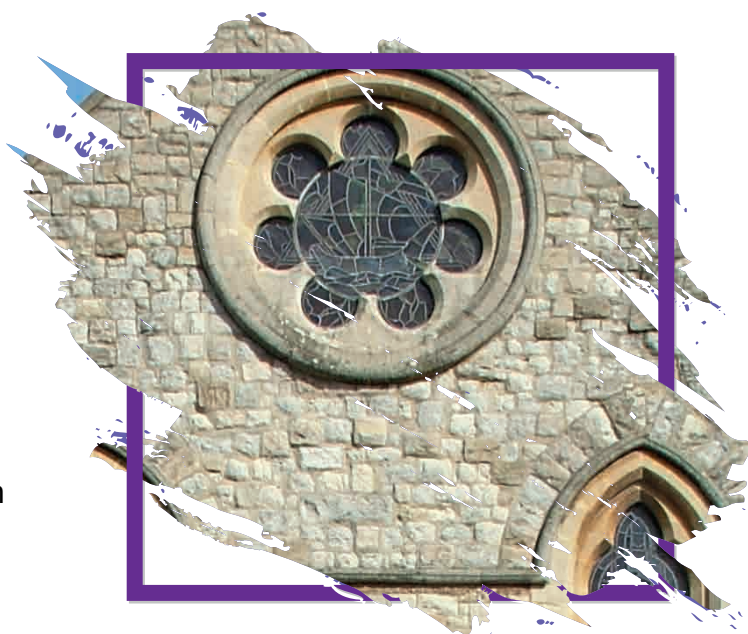

Curate's Report

Moses answered the people, "Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today. The Egyptians you see today you will never see again. The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still" (Exodus 14:13,14)

The past year has been a hugely challenging one for our church. Trevor's sudden and unexpected death last October was a devastating shock to our community here, as well as many others locally, across the country and overseas. Each of us will have our own special memories of him, but as someone who came to HTR as a new Curate, I feel I have lost a wise teacher, a gentle counsellor and a friend who did so much to encourage me in my ministry. I echo words that our Churchwardens wrote back in February, when they said they felt privileged to have shared ministry with him and to have seen our church grow and flourish so much under his visionary leadership.

When we shared a church morning together earlier this year, David Cooke highlighted the verses at the top of this report, which he sensed were a particular word from God for us at this time. The Israelites were being pursued by the Egyptians and, hemmed in by the Red Sea, they wonder where God is in their desperate circumstances and they fear for their lives. But Moses tells them three things - do not be afraid ...

stand firm ... be still. In the midst of our uncertainty, our questions, our fear, the same unchanging God speaks the same words of encouragement to us and gives us hope for the future. He will continue to guide His people, and to watch over and build His church here. Our responsibility is to actively look to Him and rest confident in Him.

While the last few months have been very difficult, it has been hugely encouraging to see how ministry is continuing at HTR during this uncertain time, and I'm grateful for the part that so many of you have played in this. The need to reach out with God's love and power, and to help one another live for Jesus, remains as pressing as ever, and it's a real joy to be part of a church that understands and pursues this, and where so many people serve faithfully and selflessly through a wide variety of roles, groups and activities.

The reports in this book speak wonderfully of a church community in and through which God is at work in a whole variety of ways. The Vision Sunday leaflet we produced back in January focused on some of the highlights of 2017, which included people being healed and coming to faith in church and on the streets, others

being baptised, confirmed and taking significant steps of faith, a continuing deepening of prayer and worship across all of our church life, sharing in exciting ministry with Riverbank Trust and Kick London, our work with children continuing to flourish and our work with young people being given fresh impetus, creative All Age Services helping everyone to worship and learn together, hundreds of people from our local community and schools welcomed here to celebrate Christmas, over £55,000 given away through Gift Day and our church budget to support ministry and mission elsewhere, and a great time again away together at Focus in the summer. What a brilliant community to be part of!

This year we have said goodbye to Mark, Millie, Zoe and Evie Anderson following Mark's ordination last July. Mark is now serving as a Curate in the parishes of Oxted and Tandridge in east Surrey. Mark and Millie were with us for around 15 years, during which they served our church family in so many different ways. Millie also worked with Riverbank Trust, while Mark had a spell as Churchwarden and was on our Staff Team during his ordination training. Two faithful members of our Wednesday worshipping community sadly died during the year. Anne Ewart was a person of great warmth with a keen memory and welcoming smile. And Kay Davidson radiated a trust in her Saviour, not least of all through her joyful singing of the hymns she knew and loved. We will miss them both.

We were blessed to have Txaila Meyer and Abbie Robertson with us for a year as interns, who brought their distinctive gifts and enthusiasm to our Worship Team and Youth & Children's ministry. It was good to see them growth in faith,

learn new things and become more confident in ministry. Hannah Helm has taken over where they left off, and is playing an important part with both worship and young people.

I'm extremely grateful for the different ways in which our Churchwardens Mark Lambert and David Ewart and our Operations Manager Keith Nurse continue to support me and our church community. We are also indebted to our Church Council, Standing Committee and Staff Team, who have helped to maintain and further develop ministry and mission in recent months, and for the support they have given me in my additional responsibilities. Each of them has taken on extra responsibilities of their own, and it is great to be part of a church where leadership is shared so widely and people serve so generously. I particularly want to thank my wife Kate for her support, who has balanced working life, taking more of a lead in women's ministry, being a mum to two lively boys and looking out for me with grace, patience and good humour. It has

had a huge impact.

Please pray for Kate and I as we continue to discern God's will for our future ministry, and that He will continue to give us an assurance that He is in control. Please also pray for Kate Patterson and for Johnny, Connor and Ben as they leave us this summer, that our faithful heavenly Father will give them a deep sense of His love for them and an unshakeable confidence in Him for the future.

As I looked back at the report Trevor wrote this time last year, I found his final paragraph both moving and challenging, and it seemed a fitting end for this year too:

"Our God is good and faithful; there is so much to thank Him for as we reflect on this past year. Whatever lies ahead He calls us to come close to Him, as the writer to the Hebrews says, *to hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for He who promised is faithful.*"

particularly Keith Nurse and Joao Paulo Tavares for their work in drafting and designing the initial Parish Profile document and related job advertisement. We would also like to express our grateful thanks to John Kiddle, our Archdeacon and the Bishop's representative, and John Fisher, CPAS Patronage Secretary and representative of our church's patron CPAS, for their assistance through the interregnum and appointment process.

Building Committee Report

We continue to be blessed with minimal buildings and equipment expenditure, there being no major unplanned repairs in the year reflecting our prudent approach to preventative maintenance.

As previously noted we will soon need to address a number of issues pertaining to the fabric of the church building - particularly the roof and stonework - and parts of the Church Centre are showing increasing signs of wear and tear. To this end we redecorated the foyer giving it a fresher, more welcoming appearance.

During the second quarter we said goodbye with heartfelt thanks to our longstanding cleaner, Bridgette Martin, who retired. In light of the ever increasing usage of our church facilities the PCC concluded that we needed to invest in a more extensive, dedicated and (sadly) expensive cleaning service. Despite the extra cost we hope you have noticed and appreciate the improvements.

Although the Committee has not met formally during the year, I regularly

speak with Keith Nurse, Joao Paulo Tavares and Robert Lucas on matters that need addressing. All routine maintenance and servicing has been carried out (including redecoration in the Christ Church and Small Group rooms, and some window repairs costs following a break-in in October). No more substantial refurbishments have been started because of the anticipated major redevelopment noted below.

Every five years, the Church of England requires that every church building must be inspected by an architect or chartered building surveyor to ensure it is kept in good repair. Our latest Quinquennial inspection, carried out in April 2015, identified the roof and stonework as areas for urgent repair and refurbishment before 2020; significant challenges we were already aware of. By year end of 2017 the PCC had set aside £143,000 for the prospective building work, although our architect's estimate of the likely costings is materially in excess of this amount.

We spent 2016 prayerfully seeking God's wisdom and guidance on the direction of our church building redevelopment project. The congregation gave their input and feedback on key themes for inclusion in and exclusion from the specification that will ultimately be presented to our architect. In 2017 the PCC reviewed the feedback and made final recommendations to the Strategy Group (comprised of Trevor Patterson, Alwyn Webb, Kate Patterson

and Keith Nurse) who crafted the final specification document. Several people from our congregation with relevant building and project management expertise were invited to the first project meeting in late July but the project was put on hold in October following the death of Trevor. We await our new Vicar to give new leadership and direction to this vital and transformational project.

I am very grateful to Robert Lucas who gives us the benefit of his professional expertise, meeting and liaising with architects, builders and contractors. I would also like express my sincere gratitude to Keith Nurse and Joao Paulo Tavares for managing the day-to-day repairs to and maintenance of the fabric of the building and the Peldon Court flat so expertly and efficiently. It has been these gentlemen who effectively constitute the Building Committee and therefore deserve the recognition and my heartfelt thanks.

Mission Group

The Group is an official subcommittee of the Church Council, its main aim being to raise awareness across our church community of mission both in the UK and overseas. In recent years the Group has focused on two main responsibilities - to review and propose to the Church Council which people and organisations should receive ongoing financial support from our annual church budget, and to

propose to the Church Council how we should use the money raised from Gift Day each year. In addition to over £18,000 of mission support from our annual budget in 2017, our Gift Day once again raised a wonderful total - this time over £41,000 - to support six projects locally and further afield.

In the coming year the Group will spend more time considering how best to encourage active interest in mission, including through campaigning for change. We will especially miss Trevor's heart for mission in his role of chair of the Group, but Sara Kandiah and Liz Green have stepped forward to take the roles of chair and secretary. Thank you to them and to Karin Boyton, Becky Edwards, Robert Lucas and Catherin Tidmarsh for serving our church as members of the Group.

Life Groups

Life groups play a key role in our church as we continue to learn more about what it means to live for Jesus. We are hugely grateful to Trevor and Kate Patterson for all they invested in group leaders over the years through their teaching, encouragement and wisdom, and to all those who serve as leaders in this important area of ministry.

Alpha

We ran a 9 week Alpha course in the Autumn with 26 people regularly attending. The sudden, sad loss of our vicar, Trevor, who was leading the course along with our curate, Alwyn Webb, Ellie Hughes, Helen West, Phil Kassanis and Annette Kassanis, prompted a short postponement. It is fitting that Autumn Alpha resumed, having been established at our church by Trevor more than 15 years ago as an accessible introduction to the Christian faith and an exploration of the meaning of life. Trevor was a passionate advocate of this evangelistic course which has not only brought people to faith, but also deepened and renewed the faith of church members who have participated and helped form new friendships within our church family.

It is encouraging that the Autumn course, as in previous years, attracted a diverse group of people including invited family,

friends and regular church members as well as interested newcomers. The guest speaker at the Launch Supper was former Cabinet Minister, Jonathan Aitken. Alpha's opening theme, 'Is There More to Life Than This?', was clear as Jonathan spoke openly and honestly about his past life, including divorce,

prison and bankruptcy, as well as the lasting relationships he made with fellow prisoners and how his Christian belief transformed his life. The launch was well attended and intended not only as a taster of the course but also an event open to a wider audience to hear powerful testimony and ask questions about Jonathan's personal journey of faith.

Subsequent weeks covered areas such as 'Who is Jesus?', 'Why and How Do I Read the Bible' and 'How Does God Guide Us?'. The evenings began with wonderful meals prepared by Richard Jackson and served by Life Groups – greatly enjoyed and appreciated by all and an important part of getting to know each other in a relaxed setting. We then watched a film introducing the theme, presenting key ideas and biblical context. The personal testimonies during each film also gave a moving depiction of faith in action and encouraged interesting and challenging discussions. 13 people were at the Holy Spirit Day, held on a Saturday and providing significant opportunities to

explore the power of the Holy Spirit and receive prayer.

It was a real joy to see relationships grow over the weeks as ideas and questions are raised in an open, encouraging environment. No question is too simple or too hostile. More than anything else, Alpha is not about telling people about Christianity but showing what faith looks like: sharing the truth of God's love through friendship and bringing people into a life-changing relationship with Jesus. Worship

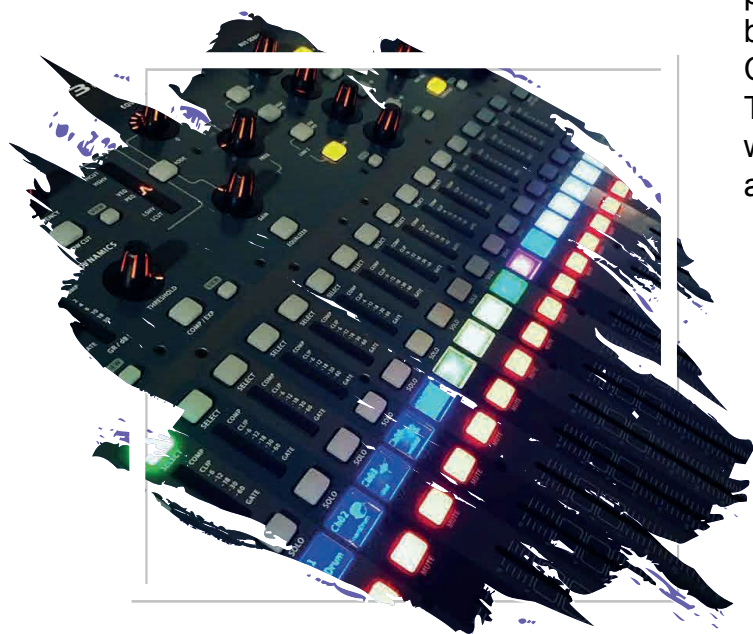

Prayer

Corrie Ten Boom once asked the question: *"Is prayer your steering wheel or your spare tyre?"* I can honestly say that prayer lies at the heart of all we do at HTR. This has become even more evident over the last couple of months.

Though there was a great sense of loss and sadness after Trevor passed away, we found solace in praying for and with each other at our regular prayer opportunities. In some way this cemented the command Paul gives us in 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18.

There have been a few changes to our regular patterns of prayer. We decided to stop the Call To Prayer meetings and focus on the Prayer Space meetings on Mondays instead. The reason for this is that we found the Spirit leading us to pray for all the things we would have prayed for at Call To Prayer anyway. It was more important for us to have consistency in our Prayer Space meetings, which has been bearing fruit. There is a core group of people who attend Prayer Space regularly and,

more often than not, we have found this specific meeting to be a truly intimate time spent with God and one another.

Prayer For The Nations has also changed its meeting time to 1530 on Friday afternoons. This meeting still has the same focus: praying for the persecuted church and for our mission links abroad.

It was very encouraging to see how people engaged with the various one-off prayer events we put on as well. There was a great turnout for our Autumn Launch event where we focussed on all the ministries being run at HTR and how all of us can get involved.

We also had a wonderful 32 Hours of Prayer during Lent, focussed on the process of appointing the new vicar and what we think God is doing here at HTR. Amazingly, we filled all 64 of the half-hour slots over that day and a half, and I'm convinced that God shifted things because of our commitment to listen to His voice.

During Holy Week we had special early

morning prayer moments which were well attended. We did the Watch & Pray event again this year, where we prayed through the night from Maundy Thursday until sunrise on Good Friday. Though this was not as well attended as last year's event, we still had a great time of worship, looking at the Word and seeking God's face for various ministries, people and situations we're facing now. A group of fifteen students joined us for one of the sessions and it was great to welcome them here.

All being said and done, I believe there is

Children's Work (0 to 11 Year Old)

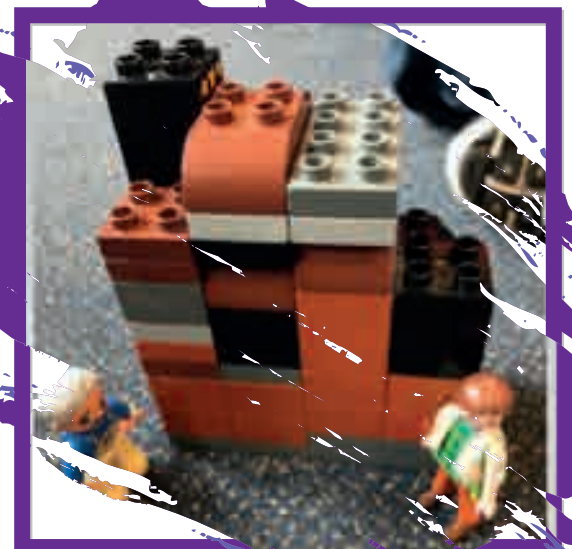

Thankfully we have an excellent team of helpers and parent helpers to support us.

We continue to base our sessions on the Scripture Union material, which we adapt and balance according to the group's needs. Where some love craft or drama, others prefer colouring or writing activities. Since Christmas, we have been studying the Old Testament stories of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob to explore the notion of faith and God's promises.

We encouraged the children to pray and ask questions in the weeks following Trevor's death and, through prayer and open discussion, we have tried to involve them in the process of finding a new vicar.

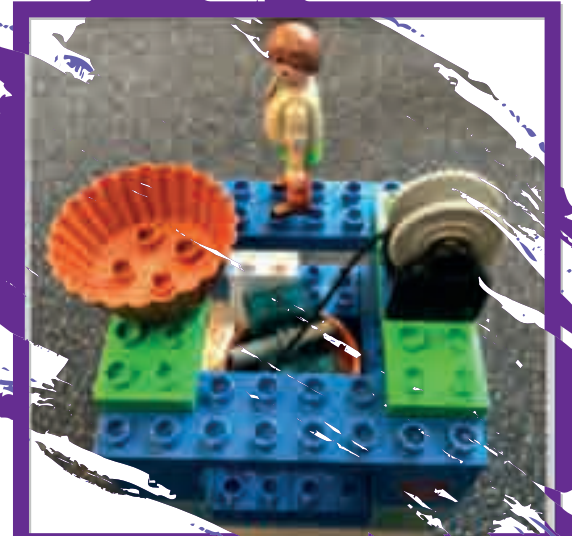
Bible Club at Holy Trinity School

Youth Work

It is an immense privilege to write this report as the Youth and Children's Minister at Holy Trinity Richmond for the second time, and I do so with a mixture of emotions as we reflect together on this last year. I am experiencing both a sense of the speed in which this time has

flown by, but also a real sense of stability and family in equal measure. I want to thank every soul for your support, love and belief as we create community amongst our young people, investing both into the Kingdom of God, and our local family.

This past year has been filled with immeasurable grief, and yet a real, overwhelming sense of God's enduring presence and grace, as often happens in his Kingdom. On a personal level, I found the loss of Trevor very difficult, especially as God had used him immeasurably in my own life. As a minister learning from Trevor, the shock was profound, and for a while I felt very lost, especially as Trevor was the most wonderful co-conspirator

for the advance of the Kingdom amongst our young people. In so many ways, the Lord has been speaking, and challenging me as I wrestle with vision, especially the continuation of the simple vision Trevor had of a Church that was not only catering for young people, but fully embraced what they have to offer. We both shared the value of young people not only being the future of the Church, but a very real, tangible present.

In many ways, my own sense of grief and loss was shared by our young people, especially as they lost a beacon of stability in their own lives. For the vast majority of the youth in our Church, Trevor has been the only vicar they have ever experienced, and so we have journeyed together in learning about growth, and change, and the truth that we are always safe when we are held in God's embrace. But God doesn't just want us safe, but dreaming, building and advancing the Kingdom of Heaven here on Earth.

Our weekly programme

At the moment, our youth programme consists of a three event programme of discipleship and outreach, which we have mostly aimed to maintain over this past year, especially as we were not able to successfully enlist a specific youth intern for this academic year, though our Youth and Worship Intern Hannah Helm has been a wonderful and invaluable support to me over this period. On a Sunday, we are currently running Quest, our 11-14's programme during the Morning Service, and a small community of 14-18's are beginning to become very at home in our Evening Service community. We are also continuing to run two small groups every Monday, and our youth outreach cafe every Wednesday, 'Collide'.

Quest is currently our most attended community where we have seen the

growth over the past year. With a new intake of year 7's, a brand new, exciting community is forming during our Morning Service. As you will probably have noticed, our venue has changed from the Vicar's Office to the Upper Vestry, which is accessed from behind the Worship Team on a Sunday morning. This decision was especially made in order to release the Vicar's Office to create room for a 'chill out' zone for our Children's groups, but has proved very popular as young people feel like they have their own space. Over the past year, we have especially been focusing on 'The Kingdom of God' in our youth work, as we explore the message, cause and revolutionary vision of Jesus, and God has been leading us as a group to look at different ways we can reach out to those around us. More often than not, this community will dynamically disrupt the Youth Minister's plan as they wrestle with different topics that are important to them, such as science and religion, and I am very excited about the potential for growth in faith in this group.

Our Monday boys' and girls' small groups are also doing very well, with a real depth of relationship and seeking God occurring in both. The girls' group

is especially flourishing spiritually as the young women in our Church take on a real mantle of leadership. Led by Ellie Hughes, Kate Webb and Hannah Helm, our girls are marching towards real leadership as they pray powerful prayers, lead each other in Bible study and explore the wonderful plans God has for them! Our boys have got a slightly different flavour as they debate, question, and build relationships with each other, with the flagship 'honesty hour', where we spend time building accountability and transparency with each other, alongside the odd card game!

Outreach and events

On a Wednesday, Collide meets at 1800, and continues to attract a small cohort of young people who have not grown up in the HTR community, alongside the regular membership. We are continuing to wrestle dynamically with the correct balance during this group, and are still dreaming of a quality venue where young people will feel comfortable inviting their non-Christian friends. While we

have not yet fully met this goal, we are passionate about building a space that is owned by and for young people in our borough, that is attractive to those on the fringes and the outside of the Church community. We have, however, built a real 'board game' culture that runs counter-cultural to the trends of today's world. Where young people are continuing to develop in this digital world, we are beginning to cultivate a culture of relationship in a very analogue format! In creating a space where young people are given a space at a table, we are fostering deep relationships with a small group that has the potential of growing into a real spiritual family with time and investment. Our dream is to be able to offer young people a real alternative to a culture of distance, and God is moving us in that direction.

On a Monday I am continuing to support Tom Rutter and the Chaplaincy at Christ's School, where we offer a lunchtime club for young people. This is one of my favourite times of the week as I spend an hour with around 20 year 9 boys, where I feel like I have built great and lasting relationships with a real sense of camaraderie and trust. We continue to dream and vision for this space to develop more spiritually as we

continue to introduce Christ into the lives of these young people.

In August 2017, we partnered with Bless Community Church in Ealing to deliver our Soul Survivor Residential, where we joined 8,000 other Christian young people, which was largely successful, especially as several members of our community responded wonderfully to calls to follow Jesus. Moreover, many of our young people had wonderful encounters with the real presence of God and learned a huge amount about faith and scripture while having a lot of fun, though a few of our Richmond teenagers didn't much appreciate the low-key camp catering, much to our amusement! It was also a wonderful opportunity to make lasting friendships with other local Christians from down the road. In 2018 we are planning on returning to Soul Survivor, this time expanding our partnership to include St John's Church in Ealing, who have offered to take on the huge job of catering, making the Youth Minister at Holy Trinity Richmond far less stressed!

The future

This period of adjustment has been difficult for our youth ministry in many ways, but God is speaking, and we are beginning to get very excited. I have spent a considerable amount of time dedicated to visioning alongside our young people as they step up into spaces of leadership, and we believe God is calling us into a new vision, and I want to take this time to report what I believe is a prophetic moment for our young people.

As we have journeyed together, we have especially sensed God speaking to us about the journey itself, and how

change and transformation mirrors our own journey with God, which is why a particular theme has arisen! We have, after consulting our young people, decided to relaunch our youth work programme in September with a new vision, and a new name! While reflecting on the theme of moving from one space to another under God's leading and pastoring, our wonderful Operations Manager helped us to come up with the name 'The Crossing', which speaks into our call to cross boundaries, to cross from death to life and from the

inside out, but it also encapsulates our devotion to a life signed by the Cross, of dying to ourselves and being raised to new life in Christ. We are praying that The Crossing will not be a youth group, but a real movement of young people eradicating boundaries and advancing the Kingdom in our borough. We have been especially influenced in this by meditating on the similarity with the story of Israel crossing the Red Sea from slavery, and the Jordan into the Promised Land!

Alongside this, we are launching a new 11-14's programme, which we are calling 'Liberate', alongside this same theme. Israel, after crossing into the Promised Land, were called to Liberate it in the same way they had been liberated from Pharaoh. In the same way, we believe God is in the business of liberating our young people from the things that our culture imposes on them, and that he is also calling us to partner with him in liberating others. This reflects the organic movement of our youth group into a real interest in seeing 'Kingdom Come', in

seeing the poor liberated and justice to come. Our new 14-18's programme will be called Dwell, as we learn to dwell in the promised land, and especially as we are called to be 'Salt and Light' in our society, where our dwelling changes the atmosphere of the spaces around us.

We reached this vision by asking ourselves specifically how we, as a Church, are different from everyone else.



How is God leading us, and what is He shaping us to be? We know that we are an outward looking Church who alongside our partners like Riverbank Trust and Kick London, are influencing and liberating those around us. We believe that our youth work should be doing the same, and want to honour God in his vision for our Parish. I am extremely excited about where God is leading us, and hope you are too! If

you are as excited as me, let me know! We are looking for partners and leaders from our Church to come alongside our young people as they seek to shift the culture around them! We are thankful to God for Trevor's leadership of us, and with great conviction want to take the baton and run the race to Kingdom Come.

I was recently clearing out some old paperwork (our administrator Reni will be delighted to hear) and I came across a document I had written back in 2010 to be presented to HTR's Standing Committee outlining the vision for a community outreach project that would seek to reach out to the most vulnerable families and young Mums in our community. I remember that

meeting. Over the last 6 months I have thought a lot about the conversations I had that year, starting with a lunch in a café in Richmond with Trevor and Kate Patterson where I shared some of the ideas I felt God was laying on my heart, about what it might look like if the Church was to wrap itself, unconditionally and lovingly, around broken, hurting and isolated families in our community. As we have faced some of our biggest challenges so far in the last few months, particularly with regards to funding, I have thought a lot about the ridiculously brave and faith filled way this Church grabbed hold of this vision with both hands and on a tidal wave of generosity and prayer launched us into being. As we have watched fruit grow amongst our families, relationships deepen and hearts soften, even in the middle of trial and struggle, I have thought a lot about the way God moves, when His people seek justice, love mercy and commit to walk humbly with Him.



For Riverbank, as for many across our church community, we have grieved over the last 6 months for Trevor, not only one of our founding trustees but so often our loudest and greatest champion. I have reflected on the many moments over the last 8 years when my

head has dropped, when I have doubted God's goodness to us, and time and time again this faith filled man came back at me with assurance that God is with us, God is for us and we trust not in the plans of men, not in our own efforts, but in His steadfast love, His plans and His goodness to us.



Last summer, as we stared down the barrel of yet another funding shortage, Trevor shared with me a memory that the Lord had reminded him of. Almost 15 years ago, a visiting preacher (I forget his name) spoke prophetically that this was a church where many would come from the outside and that God was drawing people to our church who at the moment were far away. I am sure and certain, as Trevor was, that this is being fulfilled at Holy Trinity Richmond in many, many ways, but as Trevor prayed over Riverbank that day last

July he spoke with joy and excitement that the Lord was fulfilling this word in Riverbank; this ministry that God has called into being to welcome the outsider, to find a place for the one who seems far away and to pursue them relentlessly in love and enduring relationship, to welcome them back home.

This last year we have been so thrilled to see more of our families take steps of faith, to have more opportunities to pray for them, to invite the Holy Spirit into our times with them, and of course, with peace and joy, He always comes. And through the power of the Holy Spirit we rejoice as our families are growing in trust and confidence. We have been overjoyed at the response to our new Parenting programme; a queue to be part of it is already forming! We are so thankful that the Lord has been re-opening doors in the Queens Road Hostel and for the relationships that we are building once again there. We are continuing our quest to become Community

Sponsors in order that we might welcome a refugee family in the coming year. We are excited about re-entering Darell School this Summer and the continuing support we are able to offer vulnerable families in Holy Trinity School and Marshgate. Traidcraft

What is Traidcraft? It is an independent trading company with a linked development charity. It was started nearly 40 years ago by Christians who were inspired by Jesus' love to work towards justice, and who wanted to use fair trade to enable people to work their way out of poverty.

Why is Traidcraft important when we now have Fair Trade items in supermarkets? Because Traidcraft trades with and supports people who are living in the most severe poverty who cannot cope with the demands or scale of supermarkets.

How does Traidcraft work? There is an office/warehouse in Gateshead. Traidcraft workers visit the farmers, beekeepers, and artisan groups from whom they purchase goods. Traidcraft Exchange, the linked charity, gives advice and helps to improve working conditions. There has traditionally been a catalogue in the Spring and Autumn of each year, but now there is the website as well. Because of the Christian basis one of the ways Traidcraft has worked is

in churches, with volunteers setting up a stall. They also sell to other organisations - check at Kew Gardens shop for Traidcraft's "Artisans Fair" range!

When is there a Traidcraft stall at church? We have a Traidcraft stall every month, usually on the 4th Sunday morning, with more stalls before Christmas and Easter.

What do we buy most? Some of the most popular items are bars of chocolate, dried mango, chocolate raisins, and biscuits, plus craft goods such as the small decorated boxes, bags and beautiful earrings. We also buy the Real Advent Calendars and Real Easter Eggs which Traidcraft was involved in introducing, so that children can know the real meaning of Christmas and Easter.

How much did we send to Traidcraft in 2017- 2018? Thank you to everyone who has bought Traidcraft goods over the past year. In the last 12 months we have bought £2,125.76 worth of goods on the stall which we have paid Traidcraft.



As well as our monthly stall we use Traidcraft tea, coffee, sugar, paper handkerchiefs and toilet rolls in the Church Centre, separately ordered by the Church Office.

The Deanery Synod met 3 times in the last year. There is usually a main event speaker and also a business part of the meeting. The latter includes deanery news such as the comings and goings of clergy as well as anything else which is current and ecclesiastical! There is also a chance for churches with a particular interest to give reports on issues as varied as the Glass Door project, climate change/churches' ecological response, and Welcare charity, to name a few.

Trevor had initiated singing a hymn as a collective act of worship to open

and close the meeting. This has been much appreciated by all and the habit has continued. It adds a warmth and togetherness which we need (coming from churches with such a diverse variety of worship styles). His loss has been felt keenly by all, and he was remembered with words, prayers and silence at the meeting on October shortly after his death.

Main topics/speakers have included an excellent evening hearing from 3 people involved in children and young peoples' work (who are delivering this in varied ways), the work of the Church Commissioners and hearing from Archbishop Dr Josiah Idowu-Fearon, Secretary General of the Anglican Communion Office.

I must admit, hearing from the Archbishop was my favourite evening - and one which I came home from positively buzzing (yes, true!). He is an extremely enthusiastic speaker who spoke about the nature of the Anglican Communion, with the kind of authority that comes from experience, years of

study, wisdom and a very deep faith.

I am useless at remembering details, but the gist of his message was to place the activities of the Communion in the context of the relationship with the Church of England. He spoke of Communion as a biblical term which is more than just an agreement, and we

have to find ways to live together despite our differences.

He commented that the range of churchmanship within the Communion is wide and the Communion has mechanisms which enable it to remain together despite its diversity. He was keen to place emphasis on finding similarity and bonds to strengthen and not break up. He also mentioned the Lambeth Conference, next due in summer 2020. The Archbishop asked us to pray that bishops will accept invitations to this.

I could easily have listened to him for another hour!

Minutes of the 2017 Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The 2017 APCM took place within the 1000 Morning Service on Sunday 30 April 2017. The Service included worship, prayer, a reading and talk as usual, but also testimony and the business items necessary as part of an APCM.

ELECTION OF CHURCHWARDENS BY PARISHIONERS

1. Minutes of the 2016 meeting - Approval was proposed by Mark Lambert, seconded by David Ewart and agreed by the meeting.
2. Election of Churchwardens - Two nominations had been received for the role of Warden for the coming year, for David Ewart, proposed by Roger Marx and seconded by Mark Johnston, and Mark Lambert, proposed by Jimmie Keesing and seconded by Regina Gössel. They were duly appointed. Trevor thanked David and Mark for serving during the past year, and for the many ways in which they contribute to the life of our church. Mark prayed for our church, thanking God for His faithfulness to us and for our life together, and praying especially for wisdom as we take forward a building project. He also prayed for Trevor and other leaders in some of the challenges we face, and for us all to discern God's will and vision. Trevor in turn prayed for David and Mark, thanking God for their leadership, integrity and wisdom.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

Testimony

Mille Anderson and Jake Butler each spoke about how God had been at work in and

through their lives over the past year.

Millie spoke about a year of change and planning for change as she, Mark and their two daughters move to Oxted for Mark to take up a curacy. She has been at HTR for around 16 years, and with the prospect of moving coupled with her father's death a year ago she has faced anxious times. She has continued to discover that it's only through God's grace and actively trusting in Him that she can cope. Psalm 121:8 is a reminder that God watches over us, which was a meaningful promise both when it was read at her father's funeral and as she now faces the changes and uncertainties of the coming months. She has also been encouraged by some of the words of the song You make me brave - You call me out beyond the shore and into the waves ...

Jake spoke of how he felt he has experienced God's grace in so many ways through being part of our church community. He felt he is increasingly learning to be dependent on God and is growing in His relationship with Jesus, particularly through experiencing His forgiveness and learning to be like Him. He spoke of having a real sense of hope for the future in a God who answers prayer.

Trevor Patterson's talk

Trevor spoke on Joshua 1:1-9. Our focus this year is Live for Jesus. At the start of the book of Joshua Moses had just died and a new chapter was beginning as Joshua took over leadership, and God had promised to give the people of Israel territory. We are called to be kingdom-bringers, and our prayer as a church should be Thy kingdom come - let up there come down here. Joshua could have been overwhelmed by following in Moses' footsteps, but God told Moses He would be with him (Joshua 1:5). We've known God with us in the past year in so many ways,

indirectly through ministry and mission we've supported through the likes of Karis Kids, Wycliffe, Interserve, Riverbank Trust, Kick London, Vineyard Lunches and Street Pastors, and directly through our youth and children's work, work with the elderly and in a vast range of other ways. We are making a difference and are called to continue doing so. This calling is for all of us, with both our strengths and our weaknesses.

We can learn two particular things from this passage. First, as we serve God we must trust and obey Him (Joshua 1:8). We need to be devoted to Jesus and His word, and there are lots of ways for us to do this. Our Staff Team is an example being this, and Trevor said he was very pleased that Alwyn and Kate Webb have been given permission to stay with us for up to another year. Secondly, we must remember we are not alone; God is with us wherever we go. The incident in last weekend's London Marathon of one runner supporting another who was almost collapsing as he approached the finishing line was a wonderful example of standing alongside one another. But the Swansea runner who offered help still kept going as well. God's promise is to people who keep on moving; Joshua's choice and God's provision come together. Trevor encouraged those not yet in a Life Group to join one as they are a great help in supporting and encouraging one another in following Jesus.

As we face the coming year we can be absolutely confident that God will be with us.

Apologies for absence were received from Kate Bertaut, Sara Kandiah, Smriti Prasad-Halls and Tom Rutter.

1. Minutes of the 2016 Annual Meeting - Approval was proposed by David Ewart, seconded by Sheena Marx and agreed by the meeting.

2. Electoral Roll - The Roll is an indicator of membership of our church. Over the past year there had been 15 deletions from the Roll and 14 additions to it, giving a new total of 163, 113 of whom live outside the parish. Sadly five of our more senior members had died in the last year - Marjorie Peters, Betty Smalley, Ann Watson, and Astley and Jean Wylde.

3. Treasurer's Report - Mark Johnston explained that managing our finances is a big operation, with around 10,000 transactions a year. He thanked David Ewart, Thelma Pritchard, Coleen & Jimmie Keesing, Keith Nurse, PCC and Standing Committee for the different roles they play in this. He showed a graph of donations over the last 15 years. These had peaked before our church plant in Barnes in 2012, had then dipped as we lost several generous donors who moved to be part of the plant, but had gradually recovered to a record level in 2016. He also showed a chart of how expenditure breaks down between staff cost, the Parish Support Fund, outreach, buildings and other costs. After anticipating a deficit as we approached the end of 2016, a wonderful response to an appeal in December 2016 for donations to cover this had led to a surplus for the year of around £12,000, £10,000 of which has been placed in our Building Fund.

Our 2017 budget is a break-even one. Although donations remain flat, this is against the background of 2016 being a record year for giving. The loss of donors who have died or moved also means we need to find new donors, or existing ones who

will increase their giving. Through Giving Sunday we have reached our regular giving target for the year, but remain around £35,000 short on one-off donations for the year. We need to continue to plan for income to match expenditure, rather than drawing on our reserves. This looks daunting, but we have seen God provide wonderfully in the past.

- Approval of the 2016 Accounts was proposed by Mark Lambert, seconded by Judy Mathieson and agreed by the meeting
- Adoption of the 2017 Budget was proposed by Ellie Hughes, seconded by Liz Green and agreed by the meeting
- Appointment of John Helm as our Independent Examiner was proposed by Katy Johnston, seconded by Ian Bridges and agreed by the meeting.

4. Election of PCC members - Trevor explained that we need to elect three PCC representatives to serve for three years. There were three nominations - Kate Bertaut (proposed by Sue Jackson and seconded by Joao Tavares), Mark Johnston (proposed by Mark Anderson and seconded by Keith Nurse) and Sara Kandiah (proposed by Michelle Rutter and seconded by Karen Block). They were duly elected.

5. Election of Deanery Synod members - Trevor explained that we need to elect four Deanery Synod representatives to serve for three years. There were four nominations - Karin Boyton (proposed by Tom Rutter and seconded by Nima Paribag), Judy Mathieson (proposed by Sara Kandiah and seconded by Jean Tan), Sue Reed (proposed by Sue Martin and seconded by Keith Nurse) and James Thornton (proposed by Dorothy Stride and seconded by Graham Bamping). They were duly elected.


6. Election of Sidespeople - Trevor briefly explained the role of Sidespeople and said that we are electing members to serve through both our Sunday Morning and Sunday Evening Teams. This was seconded by Jean Tan and agreed by the meeting.

7. Closing remarks - Trevor gave huge thanks to the large team of people who share in ministry in and through our church in such a wide variety of ways. He particularly acknowledged their generous service, and looked forward to another exciting year. He especially thanked Kate Patterson and their boys, Keith Nurse, Joao Tavares and the whole of the Staff Team. Mark Lambert in turn thanked Trevor for his leadership and vision, and for the way that, like Joshua, he guides and encourages our church.



Our hearts are filled with thankfulness for all God has done in the last 12 months at HTR, in our own lives, and in the lives of the new people He has drawn into our community. The last year has been unique in its own way, but so has God's care, love and faithfulness.

Many people have contributed to this book and we are extremely grateful for their devotion and service. The words here written express the wonderful work which goes on at HTR, and we would not be able to do it without your support and God's guidance.
