Reflection

Well, we are all certainly going to have a story to tell at the end of this pandemic! And from what I'm hearing it seems like we are each having rather different experiences. I wonder what it is like for you? My experience has largely been defined by "home-schooling" my two young girls. This has been a mixed experience! One day we were looking at the topic of space and we were making planets and stars – we were having a great time, but then my 5 year old asked me a rather tricky question, she said "mummy, is Heaven in space?". Errrr I didn't know how to answer that! Maybe one of you can help me with an answer!

But, I wonder what you think of when you hear the word heaven. What images does it conjure up? I think of verses in the Bible about God's kingdom where we hear there will be peace, and no more tears or sickness, which sounds pretty good right now.

This is something that seems to be on Paul's mind in the first half of today's passage. So, let's just remember the context of this letter. We've heard in this series that Paul is in prison for sharing the good news about Jesus as king, and he's having a pretty rough time and I don't think he could take it for granted that he was going to survive his situation.

It would certainly be very understandable if Paul had got to a point where he was frankly fed up and dreamt about being somewhere a whole lot better, like heaven perhaps. However, that's not what we see in this letter. Paul isn't writing like someone who has given up. No, he seems totally alive in trying to continue his mission in spreading the word about Jesus. Imprisoned or not he seems determined to get the gospel message out and encourage his fellow Christians in Philippi. Paul actually seemed rather excited! Since his life got turned upside down by Jesus he has dedicated all that he is and everything that he does to Him.

But beyond his mission here on earth, Paul is longing for the day when he can be fully united with Jesus. He says in verse 23, "I desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far".

He is longing for the time when he can run into Jesus' arms, when he can fully be with the person he has been serving with such passion.

BUT, after a bit of wrestling Paul recognises he has a job to do first. He has a role that he is uniquely placed to do, in helping spread the Good News about Jesus. Who he is and what he has been through makes him uniquely able to share the gospel in the way that he is. He has been called to be an apostle to the gentiles and there were still plenty more parts of the world that hadn't yet heard about Jesus. He still had a mission to do. Heaven with Jesus would just have to wait!

And the same is true for us, we have a mission to do. As Dan helped us to remember last week, through His Holy Spirit, God has given each one of us a purpose, a mission on this earth. Each one of us is unique and that purpose we are given from God is specific for each one of us. And that applies very much as we negotiate this pandemic.

I don't know whether you can relate to Paul in his longing to meet Jesus, maybe you can, but I'm sure you can empathise with how he feels if you imagine the time when you'll be able to run into the arms of loved ones when social distancing restrictions are fully lifted. But right now, as Paul did, we have a mission to complete. Whatever your story, or your experience is in this pandemic, God has a mission for you - to share who He is, what He has done in your life, and His love, whether that is through praying, caring, working, bringing hope, recovering, schooling, all of the above. Who you are and what you have been through will make you uniquely placed to do it in the way that only you can. There is work to be done. And Paul gives us an instruction on how we should do it in the second half of today's passage.

In verse 27 Paul says, "Whatever happens, conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel." When I first read this phrase I immediately remembered an emergency school assembly we were called in to where some older children had behaved badly in their school uniforms, and the headteacher called us all into the hall and said "When you wear your uniform you must behave in a manner worthy of this school!". Perhaps there is a slight hint of teacher-ness here as Paul reminds the Philippians that they are representing the Christian church/Jesus and therefore should behave well! As should we, no matter how many times your toddler draws on the walls in my case!!

But if we go back to the Greek translation, there is something rather deeper going on. Paul uses a word (which I won't try to pronounce) which basically means "behave as if you're a citizen of the

kingdom". The word citizen conjures up all sorts of thoughts – if you're a citizen you belong, you're secure, you have a home, <u>and</u> you have all the rights and responsibilities that go with that.

In verses 27 and 28, Paul spells out 3 ways that we can live as citizens of God's kingdom. Firstly, we are to "stand firm in the one Spirit". We remembered last week how at Pentecost God sent His Holy Spirit to be with all believers. Dan reminded us that the Holy Spirit allows us to be connected with God and to be transformed to be more like Jesus, which is so important as we remember we are representatives and very much need His help to be able to do that well. And His Holy Spirit gives us that new purpose, that mission to share God's love and a Boldness to do so. The early disciples were sent out to do their job equipped by God. He didn't ask them to do anything without His help through His Spirit. As citizens of the kingdom, like the disciples in those early days, we too can know that God is with us through His Holy Spirit, transforming us and equipping us, helping us to stand firm.

Secondly, Paul says he expects to see the Philippians "striving together as one for the faith of the gospel". As we've thought about before at Holy Trinity, we were never meant to do any of this on our own. And in this world where the church has been physically scattered into homes, it's even more important that we remember we are <u>one</u> church, working together, side by side, virtually and spiritually if not physically at the moment. Whatever our unique and individual callings and purpose are in this time of pandemic and beyond, we are in it together.

And thirdly, Paul reminds us we should do this "without being frightened in any way by those who oppose [us]". The church now, as it did then, faces opposition for its loyalty to Jesus. But Paul reminds us that as citizens of the kingdom of God we do not need to be frightened. Just a few weeks ago we remembered Jesus' victory at Easter. One day the whole world will acknowledge Jesus as king, and that is a truth we need to hold on to when things get difficult. In Psalm 27, David says "The LORD is my light and my salvation-- whom shall I fear? The LORD is the stronghold of my life-- of whom shall I be afraid?".

So, as we enter this new week, as citizens of the Kingdom of God, let's stand firm, let's remember we are not alone – God sent His Holy Spirit to equip us, and we are standing side by side with each other. One day we will be fully united with Jesus, and as Paul writes it will indeed be "better by far", but until then let's each of us go and do the mission that God has called us to, in faith, in hope and in trust. Amen!
