A Tribute to Trevor's life

The final prayer

It was with great sadness that we received the news that our vicar, Trevor Patterson, died on Tuesday 10 October following a heart attack while out running. This has had a huge impact not only on our church

community but also on many people near and far who were blessed by his ministry and friendship. Trevor's

Thanksgiving Service was held on the afternoon of 30 October at St Stephen's Church, Twickenham, and approximately 700 people attended. On that Monday tears were shed, but also Trevor's life was celebrated in many different ways. Beautiful Trevor wrote in his journal says: "Lord, Thank you that you live within me. May your amazing grace flow out of everything I do. Fill me today with the knowledge of your extravagant love and the intimate friendship of the Holy Spirit."

and memorable words were shared by friends and family, and a real sense of how special Trevor was for each and every one of them was felt. Also, Trevor's love for God was celebrated. The final prayer Trevor wrote in his journal says:

Tristan Blood, a member of HTR, wrote in his tribute: "When Paul writes in 1 Corinthians about the church as the Body of Christ, and each of us as a different part, I like to think of Trevor as the tip toes, that gave us the spring in our step, but also that lifted up every other part. Today he would be saying to us, on tip toes and arms "Come outstretched,

on church! Keep going! Your labours are not in vain! Jesus is waiting!" Trevor, thank you for showing us the way, for being the most Christ-like of men, and for running the finest of races with the biggest of smiles."

Johnny Patterson, Trevor's eldest son, shared a moving tribute, and part of it says:

"As Dad put himself in the way of grace, he grew in patience and love. I saw a tangible change each year of my life. What was behind this change? A deep belief in a God who accepted him regardless of his mess or his failings.

He used to speak with wonder of the cross: that Jesus would die for his sin, our sin ... And as someone who had received grace, Dad extended grace

to me – he was quick to forgive, never holding a grudge. I knew Dad would forgive me, even when I didn't deserve it. He showed me a glimpse of the forgiveness and grace which is



eternally promised by my heavenly father."



However, we have seen our church come together in this time of grief and mourning. Moreover, we have experienced God's love and comfort during this challenging time as many have been praying and God's love has been poured out.

While we are without a vicar, our Churchwardens - Mark Lambert and David Ewart - become officially responsible for the smooth running of the parish. However, unlike many other churches, we are blessed to have a Curate, Alwyn Webb, and staff team in place, which both helps ministry to continue and covers things that might otherwise fall to the wardens. We are also in regular contact with our Diocese through our Archdeacon, John Kiddle.

It does this through partnerships with churches across a number of London Boroughs. Guests experiencing homelessness can also access advice, food, showers and laundry facilities from drop-in day centres. Glass Door not only saves lives by providing refuge from the cold, but also helps guests build more stable futures. You can find out more about the charity at http://www.glassdoor.org.uk

Glass Door is planning to launch a shelter in Richmond Borough in January 2018 (therefore covering just half the winter in its first year). This will involve seven churches hosting on one regular night each week. It's unclear what the level of demand will be, but there could be up to 25 guests, mostly men, with separate sleeping spaces provided for men and women. Bedding is just a mat and sleeping bag, and this is provided by the charity.

Verses to live by

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 ¹⁶ Rejoice always, ¹⁷ pray continually, ¹⁸ give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

Being married to an American, and raising children with US citizenship, I have been exposed to the wonderful US holiday of Thanksgiving, a day spent with family and friends, feasting on too much delicious food, with the focus on being thankful. It is an easy scene in which to feel thankful, in the company of those you love and being fully satisfied on turkey with all the trimmings. But God wants us to be thankful in all circumstances, even when we are hungry, sick, sad or lonely. In a recent life group study we learned that the most frequent GLASSDOOR Homeless support in West London churches

Each evening will require a team of volunteers to prepare a meal between 1800 and 2000, then serve the meal and talk to the guests who arrive at 2000. Volunteers then clear up and leave at 2200. Glass Door provides at least one and usually two workers, who let the guests in, stay all night and make breakfast in the morning. Guests then leave at 0700.

For 2018 a shelter will operate in our Borough for 12 weeks from 15 January. Although we will not be a host church, you are welcome to be involved with the scheme at another church. Further information about this will be available in the coming weeks.

type of command in the bible is to give thanks, to rejoice, to praise; in essence to be in a state of happiness focused on God. God wants us to be thankful even when the circumstances make that challenging. These verses in 1 Thessalonians are a useful reminder, that being thankful doesn't have to mean being fully satisfied. God's will is that we also pray continually while rejoicing and giving thanks in all circumstances. As Christmas approaches, I am reminded that to be thankful is a calling, a state of being into which I can take my hunger and my needs to a Heavenly Father who knows what we need even before we approach him, and in Christ has given us a living bread and water that will never leave us hungry or thirsty.
