What are you hoping for?

Christmas is a time for hope. For many of us that begins when we are children, hoping for just the right present on Christmas morning.

I remember when I was a boy putting together my list of all the things I would like for Christmas. This usually involved scouring through Christmas catalogues back when that was a thing! Once I had compiled my list with

serious thought and consideration, it was handed over to my parents. Then came the time for hope: would I get that thing I was really hoping for on Christmas Day? Would I get any of the things on my list? The days running up to Christmas morning were spent in hopeful anticipation.

As adults we may not compile Christmas lists in the same way as we did as children (or perhaps you do) but we still hope. Our hopes are less fixed on toys and games, and more on larger realities: a hope for peace, or safety, or stability in our world; a hope for joy in the coming year; a hope that all will be well.

Hope is never more clearly seen than when you are expecting a baby. Nine months of waiting is filled with hope and expectation -hope for the life yet to be revealed, hope for who they might be and what they might achieve, hope for their relationship with you, their parents, and the world around them.

I imagine Mary and Joseph were filled with hope as they made their way to Bethlehem on that first Christmas long ago. I expect they were hoping for a better place for the birth than a dirty old stable too! But as Jesus is born on that night, the hopes of Mary and Joseph are fulfilled. And not only theirs, but ours too,


since Jesus comes as the hope of the whole world.

Our 2022 Gift Day raised a wonderful total of just over £28,000, which will help to rebuild The Leprosy Mission's Research Centre in Nepal, support radio stations in Ukraine through FEBA, and enable Open Doors to help women across the world who are persecuted for their faith and their gender.



After two years of learning, Louise McFerran was licensed as a Lay Reader in Southwark Cathedral in October. Louise is already involved in the life of HTR in many ways, and we now look forward with her to seeing new ways in which she will serve our church family.



We took part again this year in <u>Tearfund's</u> Big Quiz Night, joining hundreds of other churches for a fun evening while raising money to help end extreme poverty. While this year's total has yet to be finalised, the four previous quizzes have raised over £800,000. Tearfund works in more than 50 countries around the world, working through local partners to help individuals, families and whole communities reach their God-given potential.



At our annual <u>Vision Sunday</u> this autumn, our Vicar Dan used this image of a flourishing and fruitful tree to remind us of what God wants to do among us - to give us life through Jesus, so that we, in turn, as a church can offer everyone life in Jesus. For the coming year we will focus on *welcome* and *wellness*; we want to be able to welcome people into every part of our church life and remove the barriers to them finding that life that Jesus offers, and to ensure our spiritual lives are healthy and growing.
